Shortly after graduating from SUNY New Paltz in 2007 with a degree in Visual Arts, Salvatore developed a passion for Opera, and discovered Daniel Ragone for vocal coaching. He has been studying with Daniel Ragone in Port Jefferson, New York since 2008, learning songs and arias from various time periods and languages. He has performed numerous times at "Opera Night" in Northport, New York, as well as "Music on the Sound" in Port Jefferson, New York. Salvatore will be

making his operatic debut as the Duke of Mantua in this production of Rigoletto.

TAMARA CASHOUR returns this season as Musical Director of The Footlight Player's RIGOLETTO, after serving in the same capacity for TFP's 2011 TRAVIATA. Ms. Cashour has been a musical director/coach-accompanist for US regional opera, including Lake George Opera, Indianapolis Opera, Natchez Opera, and the Hawaii Performing Arts Festival. She has also considerable experience as a conductor of musical theatre at: George St. Playhouse, Weinberg Ctr. For the Arts, WOTUTS, and most recently at SOPAC (South Orange Performing Arts Ctr.), where her conducting of Guettel's The Light in the Piazza received critical acclaim: [Ms. Cashour conducted]...a highly creditable musical performance... Kudos are due Ms. Cashour, who did yeoman duty in bringing the musical portion of this production to life" (South Orange Patch). Ms. Cashour is currently Adjunct Professor of Instrumental Accompanying at William Paterson University, in the Brass, Woodwind and Strings Departments. She has also been a vocal coach/recital accompanist at the Manhattan School of Music (1999-2007) and at the Mannes College of Music (2008-2011).

BERNIE GENZER is a retired NYC. High School of Speech Drama teacher after 30 years. He has a Bachelor's degree from Brooklyn College in Speech, and a Master of Fine Arts in Theatre from Boston University. Presently his other activities are designing the lighting for Lantern Theatre productions and teaching fencing for the Great Neck Arts Center. He also is involved in singing Barbershop Harmony as a Bass with the Long Island Harmonizers Chorus and his quartet All in A Chord. I would like to thank Bob Heim for steering him to this production, and my love, Beverly for encouragement and support. He has directed musical productions such as The Pajama Game and Annie, and acted in Lovers & Other Strangers, A Funny Thing Happened On

The Way To The Forum, and Fools.

NATHANIEL GREEN is the Footlight Players' founder (1984) and artistic director. This ensemble has brought a large variety of fully staged theatrical productions to the community, including: The Marriage of Figaro, Rigoletto, Tosca, She Loves Me, The Glass Menagerie, The Price, Henry IV, and Othello just to name a few. He has also staged original works of his own, such as This Train of Life, The Enchanted Spring, Is the Glass Half Empty or Half Full?, Grampa Says Goodbye, and The Dancing Monk, and most recently, the successful Off-Off Broadway productions of Searching for Hamlet and Faust Meets Macbeth. He has also performed in opera, musical theatre and caberet. La Traviata is the 7th production by Nate that the Church of The Ascension has hiosted; other performances have been: Hamlet, Our Town, The Importance of Being Earnest, Arsenic & Old Lace, Blithe Spirit, and The Tempest. Nate counts among his favorite Skakespearean roles: Iago, Falstaff, Hamlet, and Prospero. He considers himself fortunate to have sufficient interests (art, literature, foreign languages, and travel) to ward off "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune".

GINA HAVER has a background in theatre, oratorio, sacred music and opera. She's performed as a soloist at Avery Fisher Hall, Merkin Concert Hall, CAMI Hall, 92nd St. Y, Hecksher-State Park, Northport Theatre, Symphony Space St. Ann-Trinity Church, Brooklyn and Dicapo Opera Young Artist Program. She's performed as a soloist with NY Selan Ensemble, New York Chamber Players, the National Chorale Northport Opera, and NY Choral Society Summersings. Solo work includes: "Carmina Burana", "Israel in Egypt", Brahm's "Requiem", Mozarts's "Exsultate Jubilate" and opera roles such as: Queen of the Night in Magic Flute, Mimi and Musetta in La Boheme, Lola in Cavalleria Rusticana as well as Masterclass, Amadeus, Ladies in Retirement, Last of the Red Hot Lovers and What Remains. Gina is also a founding member of OperAlive, the newly formed opera ensemble performing throughout Long Island. She also sings regularly in Northport's Opera Night concert series. Gina is the Soprano soloist at the Church of

The Ascension and cantor/pianist at St. Luke's RC Church.

ERIC KELLER attended Florida Southern College for his undergraduate degree in Music Education. He then received his graduate degree in Vocal Performance at the St. Petersburg State Conservatoire of Music in St. Petersburg, Russia. His festival credits include the roles of Zuniga in Carmen at the Bad Hersfeld Open Air Opera Festival in Bad Hersfeld, Germany, the Commendatore and Don Carlo in Aleksander Dargomyzhsky's opera The Stone Guest at the Paley Festival in Richmond, VA, Ben in Menotti's The Telephone at the Fringe Festival in Edinburgh, Scotland, and the bass soloist in Bach's Canata Nos. 208 & 212, Handel's Ode for the Birthday of Queen Anne and Purcell's Come Ye Son's of Art (Birthday Ode to Queen Mary) at the Wicklow Festival in Wicklow, Ireland. His latest roles were Figaro in LeNozze di Figaro at Symphony Space in New York City and as Lord Tonosan in the Japanese opera Amanjaku and Urikohime at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC and as the featured soloist of Russian arias with the Guangzhou Symphony Orchestra and Maestro Alexander Vedernikov in Guangzhou, China. His future engagements will include his debut at Carnegie Hall as the bass soloist in Mozart's Vesperae solennes de confessore and in Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with L'Orchestre de Bretagne in Rennes, France. Mr. Keller has also performed solo concerts in Russia. Czech Republic, Slovakia, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Finland, Holland, Ireland and the UK.

LYDIA PAULSEN was born in Queens, NY. She has been a Rockville Centre resident & member of the Church of The Ascension since 1986.
